Annual Report to the Public

District Goals

#1 - Based on Spring 2026 ATLAS summative assessment results, the percentage of students scoring at Level 3 or 4 in literacy will increase from 33% to 50% and the percentage of students scoring at Level 1 in literacy will be reduced from 26% to 15%.

#2 - By the end of the academic year, the percentage of students scoring at Level 3 or Level 4 in math will increase from 32% to at least 50%, and the percentage of students scoring at Level 1 will decrease from 35% to below 20%, through targeted remediation, differentiated instruction, and biweekly skills assessments.

#3 - By the end of the 2025-2026 school year all core subject teachers (ELA, Math, Science, and Social Studies) at Ozark Mountain School District will consistently implement high quality instructional materials (HQIM) aligned to state standards in at least 90% of their weekly instructional time, as measured by monthly lesson plan reviews and weekly classroom observations conducted by building and district administrators in order to improve student engagement and academic outcomes.


BMI assessments are done annually.


Schools are assessed annually using the CDC's School Health Index. Schools health and wellness plans are written based on this need's assessment.


Various middle and high school grades participate in the Arkansas Prevention Needs Assessment Survey.


Parent & Family Engagement
